With digital images being accepted the competition judges will also be looking for images that are a true representation of life on Earth and those that have NOT been manipulated. All the winning and commended photographs will go on display at the Natural History Museum, London, from 23 October 2004 until spring 2005. The exhibition will be touring the UK, as well as many countries overseas.

All the winning and commended images will be published in a commemorative hardback book, *Portfolio 14*.

Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2004

The title Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2004 will be given to the photographer whose individual image (selected from all the entries) is judged to be the most striking and memorable.

He or she will win a specially commissioned award and a cheque for £2,000, which will be presented at an awards ceremony at the Natural History Museum, London, in October 2004

Innovation Award

This award exists to encourage innovative ways of looking at nature. It is given for the image entered in any category that best illustrates originality of both composition and execution.

Eric Hosking Award

The award will go to the best portfolio of six images taken by a photographer in the age range 18-26 years that are considered representative of his or her best work and demonstrate a range of ability.

Gerald Durrell Award for Endangered Wildlife

Up to three transparencies may be entered of species officially listed in the 2003 IUCN Red List of Threatened Species as critically endangered, endangered, vulnerable or lower risk at an international or national level (if the latter, please supply details).

Adult Categories

You may enter up to **three** colour transparencies (slides) or digital jpeg images (see digital rules) on a CD in each of the following categories.

Each category has a first prize of £500 and a second prize of £250.

1 Animals in their environment

The habitat must be as important a part of the picture as the species being photographed, and the picture must convey a feeling of the relationship between them.

2 Animal Behaviour: Birds

The pictures in this category can't just be beautiful images; they must have interest value as well as aesthetically pleasing, and the birds must actively be doing something.

3 Animal Behaviour: Mammals

These photographs, too, are selected for their interest value and their aesthetic appeal and must show active behaviour.

4 Animal Behaviour: All Other Animals

As the majority of animals are neither mammals nor birds, they offer plenty of scope. Pictures will be selected for their interest value as well as their aesthetic appeal.

5 The Underwater World

These photographs can show marine or freshwater animals or plants. The most important criteria are aesthetics, but interest value is also taken into account

6 Animal Portraits

Portraits must convey the spirit of the subject and be either a close up or show the animal in full - or centre-frame.

7 In Praise of Plants

Pictures must highlight the beauty and/or importance of flowering and non-flowering plants.

8 Urban and Garden Wildlife

The judges will be looking for original pictures showing wild animals or plants in obviously urban or suburban settings (including gardens).

9 From Dusk to Dawn

Pictures must feature wildlife and must have been taken between sunset and sunrise - the sun may be on, but not above, the horizon

10 Composition and Form

Here, realism takes a back seat, and the focus is totally on the aesthetic appeal of the pictures, which must illustrate natural subjects in abstract ways.

11 Wild Places

This is a category for landscape photographs, but the pictures must convey a true feeling of wildness and create a sense of awe and wonder.

12 The World in Our Hands

These pictures must illustrate, whether symbolically or graphically, our dependence on the natural world and our capability for damaging it.

Young Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2004

This competition is open to photographers aged 17 years and under. Your pictures must show wild animals or plants, or wild landscapes. What you really need are good ideas for memorable pictures (a common plant or animal framed by an unusual background might, for example, make a better picture than a rare species in a boring setting). Concentrate on framing your subject in the best possible way, it's the shots with the best composition that usually win. The winners will be invited to an awards ceremony in October 2004 at the Natural History Museum, London.

This title will be given to the young photographer whose individual image is judged to be the most striking and memorable (selected from all the entries). Prize: £500, and a day out with a well-known wildlife photographer.

GUIDELINES FOR SENDING YOUR ENTRIES BY COURIER

You must follow these instructions to prevent your package being detained by UK Customs and to avoid paying duty. Any duty to be paid will invoiced to the photographer.

1 Value of Goods

There will be a section on the courier airway bill form requesting that you state the value of the goods for Customs. Please do not put down the insurance value here – this is not what is required. If you do, then you will either be charged import duty or your pictures will be impounded by UK Customs. What you should put down instead is the nominal value of £15 / US\$20.

2 Description of Goods

Where you are asked for a description of the items enclosed, you should state that they are: 'Photographic slides (non-pornographic) which are to be returned'

3 Customs Invoice

You should also attach to the package a 'Customs Invoice' stating the following:

- your name, street address (no PO Boxes)* and phone number
- · what is enclosed (see 2)
- that they are being shipped to us (use our address and telephone number)
- that 'they are not for resale, have no commercial value, and that no duty is payable on them, as per chapter 49.11'
- their declared value for customs purposes (£15/US\$20)
- * Please note that courier companies will not deliver to PO Boxes. You must give us your street address to ensure the return of your package.

Entries to be returned by courier

If you want your entry returned by Courier, please provide us with one of the following:

- your Courier Account Number (Fedex, DHL or UPS only)
- a ESterling cheque made payable to 'The Natural History Museum Trading Company Ltd'.
 Please note that no Euro cheques will be accepted.
 Cheque payments are only acceptable for funds drawn from a British bank and in ESterling or
- completed credit card form (found within the entry leaflet)
 UK RESIDENTS must send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to have their entries returned

Adult and Junior competition rules

METHODS OF PAYMENT FOR POSTAGE

You must enclose one of the following to cover the cost of having your entry returned.

All payments are only accepted in UK £Sterling.

- a ESterling cheque made payable to 'The Natural History Museum Trading Company Ltd'.
 Please note that no Euro cheques will be accepted.
 Cheque payments are only acceptable for funds drawn from a British bank.
- correct amount of International Reply Coupons, which are available from most post offices worldwide, and are equivalent to £0.47 (i.e. entry fee of £10 will require 32 coupons)
- a completed credit card payment form (found within the entry leaflet).

- The organisers of the competition are BBC Worldwide Limited and The Natural History Museum Trading Company Limited. The annual competition is open to anyone except those involved in its organisation and employees of BBC Worldwide and the Natural History Museum.
- Format Entries must be colour transparencies (slides, not prints) or digital images, taken within the five years immediately prior to the closing date. Do not send slides in glass mounts, as these can break in the post. Please submit originals where possible: any duplicates should be of the same format as the originals (note: no allowances will be made for poor-quality duplicates). You may crop your images before submission. Digital images must be otherwise unmanipulated and submitted, following rule 4. on compact disc (no allowances will be made for poor-quality scans).
- 3 Labelling Your name and address must be written on the slide mount of each transparency. The picture orientation should be indicated by a large dot on

- the front, bottom left corner. Up to three colour transparencies, mounted as slides, or digital images on CD may be entered in each category. No picture may be entered in more than one category. Put each slide in a separate envelope with the following details written on each envelope: category number; your name and address: a description of the subject of the picture (see rule 8); and when and where the picture was taken. The envelopes must not be sealed.
- Digital images They must have been taken at six megapixels or higher. They should be supplied as jpegs saved at maximum quality on a CD that is PC compatible. A contact sheet or prints should be provided as a quick reference. Digital manipulation is not allowed. The files should be named with your name, the category number or title, and the key subject, e.g. JohnBrown.Cat2eagle.jpg JBrownGeraldDurrell.eagle.jpg Full contact and picture details should also be inserted. into the pull-down-file information box.

- Mailing Entries should be in one package with your name on the back, with one copy of the entry form, the entry fee of £10 (per person - not per image), cost of return postage and a self-addressed envelope.
- Eric Hosking Award A portfolio consists of six images (these can be duplicates of those entered for other categories) and should be submitted in a clear-plastic transparencyholder sheet or on CD, with a list stating what is being shown in each picture and where and when each was taken (see rule 7). Put it in an envelope marked 'Eric Hosking Award', with your name and address written on the front
- 7 Copyright You must be the sole author and owner of the copyright in all pictures entered.
- 8 Subjects Domestic animals (cats, dogs, farm animals, etc) and cultivated plants (species or hybrids grown in a cultivated setting) do not count as wildlife and are not eligible subjects. You must declare if a picture has been taken in captivity or conditions that are unnatural

- (eg, if the animal has been restrained or previously kept captive). Details must be written on the relevant envelope or pull-down box (see rules 3 and 4) and you must mark the slide mount with a large 'C'. In some cases, the photographer may be asked to sign a statement detailing how and where a picture was taken. If cruel or unethical practices are suspected, the picture will be disqualified.
- Legal issues Where necessary under the Wildlife and Countryside Act or equivalent national or international legislation (eg, in the case of protected species), pictures must be accompanied by copies of the relevant permits. UK entrants should note that, without a permit from English Nature, the Countryside Council for Wales or Scottish Natural Heritage, it is illegal to photograph some British birds at the nest
- 10 Other competitions A picture that has won a prize in a major competition (one receiving more than 500 images) is not eligible for entry.

- 11 Manipulation Sandwich shots, double exposures, photographs which consist in any way of more than one separate image and images which have been digitally manipulated are not eligible.
- 12 Judges These will be appointed by the organisers to choose the winners.

 The organisers' decision on all matters relating to the competition is final, and no correspondence will be entered into concerning the competition's judging and organisation. Should the quality of entries fall below the standard required, the organisers reserve the right not to award prizes.
- 13 Notification Winners and commended photographers will be notified in June 2004. Unsuccessful entries will be returned from August onwards. Winning and commended pictures may be kept until after the opening of the exhibition in October. The results will be published in the November 2004 issue of BBC Wildlife Magazine and on the competition website.



- 14 Reproduction The organisers and sponsor reserve the right to free reproduction and exhibition in all media (now known or hereafter created) of prize-winning and commended entries, but only in connection with the promotion of and publicity for this competition and the exhibition.
- 15 Merchandise The organisers reserve the worldwide royalty-free right and licence for the full period of copyright to reproduce the prize-winning and commended images on or in relation to Wildlife Photographer of the Year merchandise.

 The organisers will at their discretion pay reproduction fees to the photographers.
- 16 Liability All slides are sent at the photographers' risk, and the organisers regret they cannot accept liability for any loss or damage of any pictures entered in the competition (howsoever caused) nor for any other loss or damage resulting therefrom.
- 17 Return of entries Slides will only be returned if photographers enclose the following: UK a stamped, self-addressed envelope and entry fee of £10.

 Overseas a self-addressed envelope, entry fee of £10 and postage costs.
- 18 Payment Entry fees and postage costs can be paid by a £Sterling cheque made payable to The Natural

- History Museum Trading Company Ltd (Euro cheques will not be accepted). Please note: we can only accept cheque payments in ESterling where the funds are drawn from a British bank, or international reply coupons (valued at 0.47p each), which are available from post offices. If you wish to pay by credit card, please complete the credit card form within the entry leaflet.
- 19 Closing date Entries and fees must be sent to the competition office by Friday 2 April 2004 (entries sent from outside the UK will be accepted up to seven days after the closing date).



Additional young photographers rules

Rules 6 to 21 of the adult competition apply as well as the following:

- 1 This part of the competition is open to anyone aged 17 years or under on the closing date (see rule 20). Entry to the junior competition is free.
- Entries may be colour prints, slides or digital images (please refer to rule 4) taken within the five years immediately prior to the closing date. Do not send them in glass mounts, as these can break in the post.
- 3 You can enter up to six pictures (colour slides, prints or digital images) in your age group category. Your name and address must be written on the back of each slide or print. Each picture should be put in a separate envelope marked with the category (A,

B, or C) and a description of the image. Refer to **rule 4** for details on entering digital images. Please complete and sign the entry form (with the signature of a parent or guardian) and send together in one packet.
